**FROM THE PRESIDENT**Rule Changes

Over the last few years, we as a community have drawn up, tested and imposed upon ourselves a number of rules. The rules' avowed purposes include protection of people and property and convenient operation of recreation assets. These rules did not come from afar nor did some distant bureaucratic "they" send them. Rather, the respective committees of THA or the THA Board of Directors-- your neighbors--sensing a need, developed them. Many of them have been modified as changing conditions evolved, which brings me to the point of this note.

Several THA members have suggested that one rule or another be changed to meet a particular set of circumstances. These suggestions have not always been acted upon simply because the correct committee never finds out about the proposal. Elsewhere in the Trails you will find a list of the various committee heads. Their general areas of responsibility, to include rule modification, are fairly well revealed by the titles of the committees. Let me suggest that if you feel that a rule needs changing, or even reexamination, you contact that committee head. It doesn't have to be formal or written; just discuss it. It may well be that after consideration your suggestion is not acted upon, but at least you will have the satisfaction of having it examined. Hopefully, you'll also be provided with a fuller explanation of the legal, social, financial or whatever considerations that went into the original rule's formula-

tion. And that goes for you young adults, teenagers, pre-teenagers, and toddlers, too. Your opinions, desires and suggestions are needed just as badly as the adults', so don't let age be a barrier to a rule change suggestion.

Truro Community Center Opening

The pool and tennis courts were successfully and officially opened for the 1975 summer season on May 24. (And opened fairly smoothly considering the number of members who waited until that date to pay their 1975 dues, which were due on May 15.) A great deal of volunteer effort went into getting things ready for the opening. Without the dedicated efforts of Vivian and Dave Watts, John Baker, and Jim Burden, it just wouldn't have happened. Did you ever stop to think what would happen if no-body volunteered for these time-consuming, frequently aggravating community service jobs? Even if your own hectic schedule of limited weekend-only free time, house and grounds maintenance, boat and golf duties, etc., preclude you from assisting, it would be nice if you went out of your way to express your appreciation to those who do manage to squeeze work for THA into their schedules.

**FROM THE BOARD**

BOARD OF DIRECTORS MEETING  
JUNE 1975

The Truro Homes Association's Board of Directors met at Cliff Neilson's house of June 18, 1975. Attending were:

The only item of old business discussed was an updated status report on the rezoning case C-662. The case is scheduled for consideration on June 28 by the Planning Commission and on July 23 by the Board of Supervisors. However, the Board of Supervisors may be successful in a legal challenge of the case.

New items of business were:

● The board approved a rule change for the pool concerning admission of adult baby-sitters at no cost so long as they do not use the pool.

● The board approved a request for \$150 by the Citizens for Protection from Repeat Offenders for publication and mailing of a report to members of the Virginia House of Delegates. This is the group that was formed after the March rape to investigate the juvenile laws.

● The board approved sponsorship of a Boy Scout troop (composed primarily of Truro boys) and use of the Community Center by the troop, if the present sponsorship by a local church cannot be continued.

● The board appointed Cathy Flamondon as Chairman of the Nominating Committee to nominate a slate of candidates for the board vacancies. Cathy will report at the July meeting the names of THA members who will serve with her.

● The board heard a report by Nat and Bill Roth concerning the traffic problem on Ann Fitz Hugh Drive which has resulted in three accidents in the last three months. The Roths agreed to draft letters to the Captain of the Annandale District Police and the County Traffic Engineering Department for the THA President's signature soliciting periodic installation of a radar trap and requesting a traffic control survey.

● The board heard a report by Cliff Neilson on a potentially difficult architectural control case and the solution of the grounds maintenance problem on the two traffic islands at the entrance to Truro off Guinea Road.

● The board approved legal action taken to date to collect 1974 TCC dues from a member who refused to cease using the TCC facilities despite his suspended membership.

● The board reviewed the status of collection efforts for the 1975 dues for THA and TCC. Approximately 22 THA (\$35) dues remain unpaid; of these, 11 are complicated by recent or predicted sales, or absentee owner situation. Each board member was assigned a proportionate number to attempt to resolve by July 1. Those remaining unresolved by then will be turned over to the attorney for collection. Approximately 30 TCC (\$112.50) dues remain unpaid, and these members will be sent a second notice as well as an explanation of the suspended membership provision of the by-laws.

## CITIZENS' GROUP RECOMMENDS SIX CHANGES TO JUVENILE CODE; YOUTH HELD IN RAPE FACES ADULT TRIAL

The Truro citizens' group advocating reform of Virginia's juvenile code has submitted its recommendations for consideration by the General Assembly.

Six specific proposals for changes in the juvenile statutes were forwarded in late May by the Citizens for Protection from Repeat Offenders, the local organization formed in the wake of the third rape in Truro charged to a 17-year-old youth, Bobby L. Wynn, Jr. The recommendations were sent to the Juvenile Code Revision Subcommittee of the Virginia House of Delegates, according to Randy Young of 4204 Elizabeth Lane, the group's coordinator. The subcommittee is chaired by Wyatt B. Durette, Jr., of the 18th Legislative District.

Meanwhile, the Wynn boy has been certified for trial as an adult and subsequently indicted by a grand jury in connection with the third rape, which took place on March 19, 1975. A by-product of these actions was the public release of Wynn's identity for the first time. Heretofore, his name has been withheld because of the confidentiality which the law requires in juvenile cases.

Wynn was certified for trial as an adult by Fairfax County juvenile court authorities on May 8. The Virginia statute which permits such certification is one of the statutes which the citizens' group is seeking to revise, so as to make certification easier to accomplish. Wynn's indictment was handed down by a Fairfax County

Circuit Court grand jury on May 19, just two months after the rape incident. In addition to the rape charge, the jury also indicted the youth for entering a Springfield home on March 18 with intent to commit assault, and with entering another Springfield home on March 21 with intent to commit larceny.

No date has yet been set for Wynn's trial. Meanwhile, he remains in custody.

The changes in the juvenile code proposed by the citizens' group are designed to help restore the proper balance between the rights of the accused and those of the public. "The present statutes are biased in favor of the offender, particularly in the case of violent crimes," Young stated. "None of the changes we propose will infringe upon the legitimate rights of accused juveniles," he said.

The six modifications to the code recommended by the group are intended to:

- give the juvenile judge more discretion in sentencing juveniles and more responsibility in their release;
- make it easier to certify juveniles committing serious crimes for trial as adults;
- establish criteria for the release of juveniles from detention facilities;
- relax somewhat the confidentiality requirements for juvenile hearings in felony cases;
- provide greater emphasis on restitution for victims; and
- reduce the backlog of routine cases in juvenile court to provide

more time for consideration and disposition of criminal cases.

The Juvenile Code Revision Subcommittee, to which the citizens' group forwarded its recommendations, is currently studying a number of possible changes to the juvenile statutes in preparation for introducing corrective legislation at the next session of the General Assembly starting in January.

A copy of the recommendations sent to the Fairfax County Board of Supervisors has brought a favorable response from board chairman Jean R. Packard. She thanked the group for its "thoughtful and detailed recommendations" and sent them to the county's Criminal Justice Coordinating Council for its consideration. This council was charged by the board with studying changes to the juvenile code following the Truro group's appearance before the supervisors in April.

### **PARK COMMITTEE**

#### Summer Woes

Summer is here and many more people are using the parkland. This of course creates more litter which the Park Committee attempts to have cleaned up on a regular basis. But we need your help. Several groups of youngsters have been hired to police the parkland routinely and keep it clear of papers, bottles, cans, etc., in addition to emptying the installed trash cans. They lug many heavy bags of trash to be disposed of at their own curbs. In the past sev-

eral weeks some of these young people have had to pick up discarded barbecues, tents, grass clippings, and even 2x4s which some THA homeowner had used to pour concrete. This is hardly fair to the youngsters or to other THA members. What would our parkland look like if all 400 of our members used it for their private debris? Please help us help the community by keeping our parkland clean. On the other hand, if you see a situation in which a particular area needs more trash containers or attention, let us know; better still, work with us in mutually correcting the problem.

#### Grass Clippings

Warm, sunny days, lots of rain and fertilizer have made our lawns grow lush and green. Each mowing fills many bags with grass clippings. While most THA members dispose of these clippings at the curb, we have recently observed many instances wherein the parkland has been used for this purpose. This is against parkland regulations, is inconsiderate, and in addition will destroy other vegetation we want to grow. Grass clippings give off a strong, undesirable odor when exposed to the sun, and could cause spontaneous combustion. Enough said. No grass clippings in the parkland, please!

#### Parkland Vandalism

The committee last month spent over \$80 trying to repair and relocate a park bench near Golden Gate Bridge. Two of our conscientious and reliable young people worked long hours digging holes, pouring concrete and repairing this bench. Each time the bench was set, it was vandalized. I might add that the vandals had to

go to some strenuous effort to do so. Eventually tools had to be used in their "sick mission." After destroying the bench, these young vandals went on with their tools to a nearby playground, and removed all the bolts on a children's slide--leaving the slide itself sitting in place, as though all was normal. Had this not been discovered by an adult--who just happened to observe the bolts and nuts in the vicinity--the first child who used this slide could have been seriously injured. If these destroyers are willing to expend so much energy doing malicious mischief, I wonder what marvels they might perform on more constructive efforts. The members of the Park Committee know who some of our vandals are (or have been), but cannot be everywhere at all times and are not policemen. If and when any vandals are caught, it is the intent of the Park Committee to name names and take appropriate action against the individual(s) and the parent(s). We urgently need the help, cooperation and support of every THA member to bring an end to these stupid acts of vandalism.

#### Japanese Beetles

Last summer THA contracted with a Leesburg firm to apply milky spore powder to the turf area of the parkland and that of the lots

of individual homeowners desiring the treatment. Fortunately the community achieved 90% participation on the part of the homeowners--the amount necessary for good results.

As many of you will recall, the beetles were devouring roses and other selected delicacies with amazing speed. But this insidious insect did 80% of its damage under the grass, eating the roots and killing lawns.

The milky spore treatment was chosen because it is cheap, permanently effective and safe. It does not kill other living things.

Basically the spore powder was applied at three-foot intervals, and will gradually spread over entire lawns (it is not needed in the woods). The powder does not kill adult beetles, which live only a few weeks, but infects and kills the grubs. These in turn infect other grubs, until the milky disease eventually covers the entire lawn. It takes about two years before a decline in the adult beetle population is noticeable; after that there will be a marked decrease each year.

Remember, the process depends upon live grubs to work. So don't apply anything (e.g., chlordane) to your lawn which will kill the grubs. If you use a lawn service, you should instruct them accordingly. If you have already applied a chemical insecticide, its effects will have to wear off before the spore powder will spread.

Don't worry when you see some live beetles this year. The treatment is working, but it takes time to see the results. Meanwhile, the best way to get rid of adult beetles is to pick them off by hand.

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TENNIS

Tennis Committee Meeting

The Tennis Committee met at 8 p.m. on June 11 at the home of Moore Lindsay. The reservation system was discussed in considerable detail. One suggestion would have the sign-up sheet posted at 6:30 each morning. The consensus, however, was that we continue the present system of posting the sign-up sheet at 7:30 a.m. for a long enough period to get a fair evaluation.

Related to the reservation system and the problems of getting a court is the tremendous interest in tennis. We probably have two or three times as many tennis players as we had two years ago. In line with the problem of getting a court, the next agenda item discussed was the possibility of acquiring additional tennis courts. A proposal that had been advanced previously would move the current basketball court to the upper parking lot and convert the basketball site to a fifth tennis court. The committee is

currently engaged in obtaining estimates of construction costs and, based on community interest and support, will approach the Board of Directors on this matter. The subject of lighting for two courts was also discussed. The committee is currently obtaining estimates for this alternative.

The next area discussed was the 4th of July holiday weekend. As in past years, the general consensus was to hold a mixed doubles tennis tournament. In view of the fact that the current Garfinckel-Kodel mixed doubles tournament attracts our top-seeded players, the consensus was to have a more broadly based mixed doubles tournament that would appeal to the maximum number of tennis players--in other words, a social and fun tournament. Paul and Chris Stewart have agreed to run this 4th of July tournament.

The last subject discussed was the pro situation at Truro. As most Truro tennis players know, we have arranged with the Washington Tennis Services to provide a teaching pro for the current season. This is a package arrangement in which our pro is entitled to a certain amount of court time and, as part of the total arrangement, provides tennis instruction at a very attractive rate to our junior boys and girls teams. The agreement with Washington Tennis Services provides that Truro will not sponsor any other tennis professionals in competition with our pro, Tom Schatz. The feed-back that the committee has received on Tom has been very favorable. A problem arises, however, when other individuals, whether tennis pros or not, endeavor to give tennis instruction for a fee in competition here at Truro. The committee decided to post a sign on the bulletin board which says, in effect, that

"tennis lessons for a fee will not be given at Truro without the consent of the Tennis Committee."

### Men's Tennis News

The Memorial Day Men's Singles Tournament fielded a turnout of 35 players, including five juniors. For the second year in a row, Bob King defeated John Tuite in the finals for the club championship. A trophy plaque for both the men's and women's singles will be mounted in the clubhouse, with Bob King's name on the men's singles trophy for being singles champion four of the last five years.

The men's "B" League team is off to a winning season. On May 31 they defeated Four Seasons Tennis Club by a clean sweep, 7-0. On June 14 they repeated this performance with another clean sweep over Lincolnia Park, 7-0. The remaining schedule is:
