Spring Comes to TruroWITH A FLURRY OF COMMUNITY EVENTS
AND THOUSANDS OF GOLDEN DAFFODILS

After a winter of record breaking cold, spring finally came to Truro, officially and in fact, last month. The advent of warmer weather brought with it a mixed bag of happenings.

- The parkland's first grass fire of the year burned about 50 square yards of grass and underbrush on the stream bank near the rear of the Ocel home at 4322 Wakefield Drive on March 7. A truck and crew from the Annandale Volunteer Fire Department responded to the alarm and put out the fire.

- Zambezi Bridge, which spans a concrete drainage ditch in the park east of Wakefield Drive, gave in to the severe winter and old age during March; its superstructure collapsed and had to be rebuilt by the Park Committee.

- A lot of the daffodil bulbs planted in the parkland last November by Truro volunteers under the supervision of the Park Committee's Taffy Coar burst into bloom in mid-March. They arrived a month earlier than the Park Committee had predicted, but the sight was just as gratifying as advertised--truly "a host of golden daffodils."

- Reconstruction began on the former Gary home at 8628 Appleton Court, destroyed by fire in February 1976. The fire took the lives of Will and Gene Gary and their daughter, Michelle. The house is being rebuilt by the Richards Group of Washington. The reconstruction is tentatively scheduled for completion in August, according to the group's director of marketing, Mrs. Warner. The new house will be much like the one it replaces, she says.

- Truro's annual wine and cheese party on April 2--one of the community's traditional events--was the Social Committee's offering for the month of April.

- The Park Committee completed its plans for the construction of check dams along Turkey Creek beginning April 16 and announced its annual Spring Cleanup of the parkland, also on April 16 (see page 6).

- A full schedule of forthcoming tennis competition was set by the Tennis Committee, highlighted by a ladies "Hi-Lo" doubles tournament on April 18-22 (page 12) and a team tennis social April 30-May 1 (page 11).

KEEP '77 DUES PAID UP, BOARD URGES

THA's Board of Directors is urging all THA and TCC members not to jeopardize their membership status by neglecting to pay their 1977 dues assessments or failing to make the necessary membership leasing arrangements.

The board reports that 60 THA members have not yet paid their \$35 dues for 1977. Second notices have

been mailed, reminding these members of the overdue payment. The 1977 dues were payable by February 15.

The official notice for the TCC dues of \$130 for 1977 will be mailed soon, the board reports. These dues are payable May 1. Those members considering leasing their memberships are asked to advise the board immediately so that the necessary arrangements can be made. In the absence of adequate written notification to the board, each member is responsible for his regular dues payment.

For non-members, pool memberships for 1977 may be leased for \$170, the board has announced, provided that memberships are available.

FROM THE BOARD

BOARD OF DIRECTORS MEETING MARCH 1977

The Truro Homes Association's Board of Directors met on March 24 at the home of Beverlee McCartney. Attending were George Walker, Liesbeth deLeede, Cliff Neilson, John Stone, Chris Robertson, Howard Cochran and Beverlee McCartney.

A written progress report was submitted by Ray Obertone, Street Lighting Committee chairman, indicating that Truro had been turned down for street lighting under the high crime area provision. He suggested sending a representative to the public hearings on the Fairfax County budget, at which funds for such programs are considered.

President George Walker reported on the insurance coverage of the

Truro clubhouse and pool area. The amount of coverage on the clubhouse was increased from \$110,000 to \$125,000 due to inflation.

The board has signed a contract with Jim and Connie Baker as pool managers for the coming summer.

Howard Cochran reported that Truro Homes Association is again sponsoring a Little League baseball team. He also indicated that there are 60 members who have not paid the \$35 THA dues for 1977.

Pieter Bottelier, Park Committee chairman, and Hyko Laeyendecker, committee member, attended the meeting briefly to present their report. They have hired the Fred Newton Co. to resurface the walkways from the tennis courts to London Bridge. They indicated that all the walkways are deteriorating and that we must start repairing them now in order to be able to use the existing foundations. They also presented a letter from Fairfax County approving the installation of gabion check dams on Turkey Creek, indicating specifications to be followed. Installation of the first two of these dams is expected to be completed in April.

John Stone reported that he is investigating the proper formula for establishing an adequate and workable reserve fund ceiling. He was asked to continue this project and to write an article for the May issue of Truro Trails on his findings.

Al Allison, Tennis Committee chairman, and Les Stermer and Goodwin Taylor, committee members, presented the plans for the tennis deck to be erected by volunteer labor, using materials paid for by the contributions to the Gary Memorial Fund. The plans were refer-

red to the Architectural Control Committee for design approval. Upon receipt of this approval, the board indicated, it would also approve the project.

Mr. Allison indicated that there have been some tennis rule changes and that these will be published in the 1977 TCC manual to be distributed in the near future.

The next board meeting will be on April 21 at the home of John Stone.

TIPS ON PREVENTING POISON MISHAPS

Although National Poison Prevention Week has come and gone (it was March 20-26) the Fairfax County Health Department offers some year-round safety rules for preventing tragedies by poisoning:

- Store all medicines and poisonous household preparations (lye, insecticide, etc.) out of the reach of children.
- Read the label before taking or giving medicine. If it doesn't have a label, don't take it.
- Don't tell the kids that their medicine is "candy."
- Clean out medicine cabinets regularly to get rid of outdated prescription drugs.
- Dispose of unwanted medicines and household products by flushing them down a drain, rinsing out the containers before discarding them.
- Don't store nonedibles in food or beverage containers.
- In case of ingestion of a potentially toxic substance, immediately call a doctor or the Fairfax Poison Control Center (698-3111).

Men's "B" and "C" Teams

TRURO'S OSSIAN HALL LANE TRACES ITS HERITAGE TO COLONIAL PERIOD

Until its destruction in 1959, Ossian Hall stood on a knoll about 600 yards northwest of the intersection of Ravensworth and Braddock Roads, almost in the center of today's Bristow subdivision. Its broad front porch, with two-story wooden columns similar to those at Mount Vernon, faced south, overlooking Braddock Road.

Ossian Hall was one of three sister houses--the others were Oak Hill and Ravensworth--mothered by the vast Ravensworth plantation. All three houses sheltered families closely tied by bonds of kinship and friendship. Oak Hill and

was built in 1735. However, local historians believe that, although a house may have been on the site as early as that, it undoubtedly was not Ossian Hall. They assume Ossian Hall was built in 1783 because there is no record of the property owner living there before that year.

The house was built on 800 or so acres of the 22,000-acre Ravensworth estate acquired in 1730 by William Fitzhugh from Lord Culpeper, then governor of the colony of Virginia. Its builder was probably Nicholas Fitzhugh, son of Henry Fitzhugh, William's cousin.

In July 1976, when we ran our historical article on early American street names in Truro, all we knew about Ossian Hall, which gave its name to our Ossian Hall Lane, was that it was "on what is now Ravensworth Road." We have since uncovered much more. Here it is.

Ossian Hall was named for a popular Gaelic warrior and bard of the 3d century whose exploits were published in "Tamora" in 1763.

When Lord Fairfax inherited the Ravensworth holdings from his grandfather, Lord Culpeper, he hired young George Washington to survey the tract. Washington is said to have lived in a second-floor room of the mansion while he worked as a surveyor at Ravensworth. Many years later General Lafayette also visited the estate and occupied a bedroom.

Ossian Hall were almost twins in design, except that Ossian Hall was larger--two rooms deep instead of one. Ravensworth, the youngest of the three (built about 1800), was the first to be destroyed (by fire in 1926); Oak Hill, the oldest, is the only one of the three still standing today.

Ossian Hall remained a Fitzhugh home until 1804, when it was purchased by Dr. David Stuart, prominent statesman of the day and husband of Martha Washington's widowed daughter-in-law. Dr. Stuart was a close friend of Washington and one of the three original commissioners who planned the proposed Federal City. The sale price was "13,854 Spanish milled



Ossian Hall was probably built in 1783--"probably" because the date is in doubt. Some records put the date of its construction as early as 1730. Research by Sen. Joseph L. Bristow, its last owner-occupant, convinced him that it

dollars," according to records of the time.

After the deaths of the Stuarts Ossian Hall passed through various hands until, in 1918, Sen. Bristow of Kansas purchased it and the surrounding land. He made Ossian Hall his home until he died in 1944. In his will Sen. Bristow directed that the estate be sold and the proceeds divided among his heirs.

Members of the Bristow family continued to live in Ossian Hall until 1951. The mansion then stood vacant for eight years. In those eight years vandals destroyed its interior and weather decayed its great porch.

Meanwhile, a New York corporation had purchased the property from Sen. Bristow's estate in 1954. It wound up in the hands of Mace Properties, Inc., of Arlington.

On September 3, 1959, Ossian Hall was intentionally burned by firemen from Annandale, Burke, Fairfax, Franconia and Jefferson to make way for a Mace-built subdivision of brick ramblers. The burning was accomplished as a practice drill for the departments involved, after Mace had failed to interest anyone in either purchasing the historic building and its plot or moving the building to a new site.

Ironically, on the sides of the Annandale Volunteer Fire Department's trucks taking part in the burning of the historic old house was the department's seal, still in use today--a picture of Ossian Hall.

Today a few huge, gnarled old oaks, dwarfing the suburban homes around them, are the only visible reminders of Ossian Hall.

TWO TRURO PUBLIC OFFICIALS ARE FEATURED IN WASHINGTON PRESS

Complimentary feature articles on two prominent public officials living in Truro appeared in Washington newspapers recently.

● In a page 1 story in the March 2 Washington Star, staff writer John Holusha interviewed Betty Murphy, of 4105 Necostin Way, chairman of the National Labor Relations Board. The occasion was the NLRB's celebration of the casting of the 30 millionth collective bargaining vote under the National Labor Relations Act. Asked if she had had any problems trying to run the NLRB as a woman, Betty responded with a story of one of her male colleagues on the board: "He came to me about six months after I came on the board and said, 'Betty, when you were nominated by the President, I felt the President had nominated a woman who happened to be a good labor lawyer. After seeing you in operation for five or six months, I think he nominated a hell of a chairman.' That was nice."

● A day later, on March 3, the Washington Post carried an article on Fairfax County Executive Leonard Whorton, of 4159 Elizabeth Lane. Post writer Maggie Locke gave Leonard high marks on his first seven months on the job. "The board wanted a strong administrator and that's what they got," she quoted Board of Supervisors Chairman Jack L. Herrity as saying. The article included the following comment from the relatively new county executive: "I would like to see that Fairfax will be a county with adequate green space, curbs and access roads, that it will have a good mix of commercial and industrial growth for a strong tax base, but that this growth will not encroach on its neighborhoods."

Check Dam Construction

The gabion plan for controlling erosion in Turkey Creek (see Truro Trails, March 1977) has now been

officially approved by the county. We are going ahead with the construction of two gabion check dams (rock-filled wire cages) on sites between Natural Bridge and Wakefield Drive, where the erosion is worst. Saturday, April 16 is the date. The committee's aim is to add three more such gabion dams next year. The plan was designed by Hyko Laeyendecker, hydrological engineer with the World Bank. He will also supervise construction. Gabion check dams on selected sites provide an inexpensive solution to the worsening erosion problem and will increase the value of our communally owned parkland. Construction of the first two dams will probably take the whole day and may spill over into Sunday, April 17. Volunteers are needed. For further information, please call Hyko at 323-3835.

Annual Spring Cleanup

April 16 has also been selected as the date for this year's Spring Cleanup. Since most of the trash is regularly collected by our teenage contractors, the cleanup will consist of spreading a layer of fresh mulch on play areas and restaining all wooden structures in the park. This is an annual routine and all residents are invited to give at least an hour of their time on Saturday, April 16, between 1 and 5 p.m. Refreshments will be provided.



Resurfacing of Walkways

In May or June some 1,000 feet of asphalt walkways in the park will be repaired and resurfaced. Patch-up repairs as we have done in the past will no longer do to check the deterioration of certain sections. The worst part is from the tennis courts to London Bridge.

Zambezi Bridge Rebuilt

Zambezi Bridge, downstream from Wakefield Drive, had to be rebuilt recently. The superstructure of the old bridge, originally constructed by Gasner and Levine, the builders of Wakefield Chapel Woods, had collapsed due to rotting of the poles.

- May 21: Swimming and Diving Team Registration.
- May 28: Opening Day.
- September 5: Closing Day.

Please do yourself a favor: read the publication and make sure your children understand those portions

which apply to their use of the TCC facilities. A few minutes of your time now to absorb the information in those 12 pages can prevent later misunderstandings, irritations or embarrassments, and enable you and your family to use and enjoy the TCC facilities more fully. There are some changes to last year's edition pertaining to TCC memberships and transfers, and to the tennis program. And note that TCC dues must be paid before a family is entitled to use the facilities.

Swimming/Diving Registration Fee

This year a registration fee of \$10 will be charged for each child who signs up for the swimming team or the diving team. This fee will be non-refundable. This change from past practice results from a majority vote on a motion made at the January 1977 general membership meeting. That approved motion expressed the sense of the community to the effect that:

- The community supports and endorses the competitive teams as healthy and wholesome summer activities which it is in the community interest to sustain.
- Those who participate on such teams should pay an amount which fairly reflects the specialized training they receive, the organized competition they experience, and the awards for which they vie.
- Future budgeting should proceed in a direction that would make those teams self-supporting.

The \$10 fee was determined based upon typical fees charged for the youth athletic programs in the area. The range of fees sampled was \$15-\$20 per child per activity. So we think our registration fee is fair, reasonable and consistent

with both the letter and spirit of the expressed sense of the community.

No special talents are required--not even the ability to swim--just one or two volunteers who care about our community and who are willing to contribute some of their time. The essence of the task is to promote a safe, healthy, wholesome and enjoyable aquatic program for all TCC members and their families. Don't decide now. Reminder on Regulations

As warm weather moves in, the Truro tennis season moves outdoors for 1977. Truro tennis players are known for their courtesy and fair play at all times. An emphasis on rules is not necessary, except to draw your attention to the new "Enjoying Truro" manual being distributed to all members. Please digest the Tennis Courts section.

Because the community decided not to expand the courts or light them, the demand for tennis time will be even greater this year as more residents take up this great pastime. Therefore the following regulations are particularly important:

● Reserve a court only in your own name, not in the names of others.

● Remove your name from the reservation sheet if you cannot play. Unfortunately, some people have reserved court time but have not showed up. This denies others the opportunity to play.

● Only employed persons may reserve court time after 5:30 p.m. on weekdays and on weekends at any time of day.

● The reservation sheet will be posted at 7:30 p.m. daily by Dean Stermer. Please wait for him or his substitute at the courts. Do not go to his home, as happened to his predecessor.

The Tennis Committee has planned an exciting and competitive season. A new court feature this year is the installation of benches next to the courts.

In Defense of Truro's Swim Program

I am distressed that newcomer John Larry Baer, addressing Truro readers in this column last month, did not do his homework concerning the swim team.

How can he state that "we have enough team training in the schools" when there is virtually none? The schools in Fairfax County have no pools, and the soon-to-be-completed Wakefield Park pool could not possibly train all the competitive swimmers, nor was it conceived to do so. Granted, the high schools

have teams that compete, but their members have grown up with swimming in summer programs such as Truro's. High school workouts are maintenance programs of approximately two hours a week, not training programs. Swimmers learn to enjoy competitive swimming in summer programs at ages 6-9, not in high school.

It is also unfortunate that Mr. Baer is unaware that the swim team not only consists of the Saturday morning team, but that developmental meets are offered any swimmer on Monday evenings. All a swimmer has to have to make the "B" team is a desire to swim. This certainly is not exclusive and the "B" meets are

for the beginning swimmer.

Perhaps it might also be pointed out that 30% of our youngsters in Truro between the ages of 6 and 18 chose to join the team last year by committing themselves to 1½ hours or more of hard work daily. It is reassuring to me to know that my children are enjoying a healthy, wholesome, organized activity during the long, lazy days of summer rather than out vandalizing the neighborhood, littering the parkland or, as Mr. Baer would say, "befouling their own nest." Swimming deserves more support, not less!

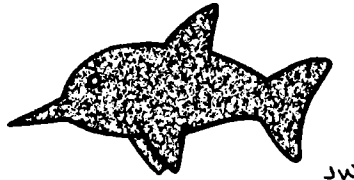
Team Tennis Tournament

Swimming **Diving**
