Bridgman-Ulman Team Wins Record Keeping Contract

A pair of long-time Truroites, Marj Bridgman and Bill Ulman, have been appointed record keepers for the Truro Homes Association, effective December 1, the association's Board of Directors announced late last month. They succeed outgoing record keeper Donna Alexander, who resigned from the position at the end of last month.

Marj, of 8834 Burbank Road, has been active in the THA since the Bridgman family--Marj, husband Wally, and their children, Chip and Tara, came to Truro in 1972. Marj served on the Social Committee for many years, and was the association's record keeper and membership chairman for three years in the early 1980s. In 1982 she was elected to the THA's Board of Directors, and was president in 1984-85. Marj also compiled and prepared for publication the last two editions of the Truro Directory, including the newest edition now be-

ing distributed.

Bill Ulman, of 8816 Charles Hawkins Way, came to Truro with his family in 1976. He is a free-lance personal computer consultant, and has assisted the THA on many occasions over the years in installing and operating its computer systems.

Donna Alexander, of 4311 Argonne Drive, was appointed record keeper in January 1988. She and her family --husband Roy (a CPA and the THA's treasurer at that time) and their two children, David and Alexis-- came to this area in the fall of 1980, and have been Truro Community Center members ever since. Donna was a member of the Social Committee in the early 1980s and co-chaired the Tennis Committee for two years.

The Bridgman-Ulman team plans to split the record keeping duties, with Marj concentrating on membership and records matters and Bill assisting in computer applications and support. The THA business telephone, on which members can leave messages, is being installed in Marj's home. The number remains the same.

In announcing its selection, the Board of Directors thanked Donna for her long and faithful service to the Truro community.

County Schools Need Bus Drivers

The Fairfax County Schools has immediate openings for school bus drivers, school officials have announced. The beginning pay is \$9.18 an hour plus benefits, including health insurance.

"A paid training program gives applicants the skills and confidence to operate a school bus safely," points out Alan E. Leis, the assistant superintendent for personnel services. "These are responsible, professional jobs with many positive bonuses. Parents may bring their preschool-age children with them on the bus. FROM THE BOARD

REGULAR BOARD OF DIRECTORS MEETING NOVEMBER 10, 1994

The regular meeting of the Truro Homes Association's Board of Directors was called to order at 8:05 p.m. by Don Johnson (president). Also present were Jeanne Gerber, Chuck Roper and Elaine Ferris. In addition, Jane Zivic attended the meeting.

The minutes of the meeting of October 14, 1994, were approved.

Financial Business

Chuck Roper gave the treasurer's report and it was approved. Some line items of the budget are under their expected expenditures, but all bills are not yet in and some bills will be paid before the end of the year. The new Truro Directory, with more than 500 entries, will cost more than the money realized from selling ads. In the 1995 budget, a small amount of money will be allocated for this expense to insure that there will be sufficient when needed.

Chuck presented a draft of the 1995 budgets for the THA and TCC. The board reviewed each line item and made some changes to them. Interest income will be up somewhat in 1995, thus offsetting some expenses expected to increase in the THA. Some increases in the TCC will occur as a result of contract commitments for pool operations. Following this review, the board asked that Chuck finalize the 1995 budget for submittal to the board at its December meeting. The board voted to set the 1995 THA assessment at \$115, the same amount as in 1994. An official notice of this will be printed in the Truro Trails in December. The 1995 TCC dues are estimated to be \$295, up \$5 from 1994. TCC dues will be finalized at the December board meeting and pub-

lished in the January Truro Trails.

Contract Business

Jane Zivic, TCC Committee chairman, submitted to the board a memo relating to proposed changes in the Clearwater pool management contract, facility maintenance contract and swimming pool rules. After discussion, these changes were approved and will be incorporated in the TCC Manual and appropriate contracts. Letters were sent to the gate keepers reminding them to comply with terms of their contract, and to Jim Bergstrom asking him to monitor the GroundsKeeper contract. The contract for park maintenance will be renewed at the same price as 1994.

The Request for Proposal for the record keeper position has been prepared and advertised in the November Truro Trails. Donna Alexander, current record keeper, has submitted her resignation letter to Don Johnson and the board effective November 30.

Committee Reports

Jeanne Gerber reported that Ron Olesch, Park Committee chairman, has work to be completed in the parkland, railings to be erected at some bridge ramps, and more trees to be removed. The problem of repairing stream banks and prevention of more erosion needs to be addressed. A Scope of Work will need to be prepared before this work can be submitted for bid.

Don Johnson reported that the Architectural Control Committee meeting was routine, with no major problems.

The Traffic Task Force meets next week, so there was no report.

Old Business

Jane Zivic will complete a cost estimate for finishing the clubhouse siding and installing new gutters, and prepare a bid package. The board authorized expenditure of up to \$500 for tree replacement.

A letter was sent on October 16 which will change our attorney to Mays and Valentine.

A letter was sent to the TCC, Swim Team and Dive Team representatives regarding safety concerns expressed by Clearwater.

A letter was sent to Anderson, Stone accepting their offer to perform audits for 1994, 1995 and 1996.

On October 22 Jane Zivic, Jane Roper, Elaine Ferris and Don Johnson met to discuss the division of responsibilities resulting from the reestablishment of the Pool Committee. Jane Roper agreed to head the committee. A letter was sent on October 26 advising Clearwater. Based on discussions at the meeting, a revised list of TCC duties was prepared and sent to Jane Roper, Jane Zivic and Elaine Ferris for review.

Muriel Hodges has consented to continue taking reservations for the clubhouse for another year. We very much appreciate this, as well as her attention to all the details of renting the facility.

New Business

Snow removal, or lack thereof, has been an ongoing problem in Truro. In order to present our concern to Fairfax County and the Virginia Department of Transportation and have our voices heard, Don Johnson suggested that this winter we keep records of times of removal, including how often and how soon after a snowfall the plows come by. A more comprehensive plan will be presented at a future board meeting and results published in a future issue of Truro Trails.

The next board meeting will be on December 8, 1994. The general membership meeting will be on January 19, 1995.

The meeting was adjourned at 10 p.m.

SPECIAL BOARD OF DIRECTORS MEETING
NOVEMBER 26, 1994

A special meeting of the Truro Homes Association's Board of Directors was held on November 26, 1994, at the Truro Community Center. The meeting was called to order at 5 p.m. by Don Johnson (president). Also attending were Chuck Roper, Jeanne Gerber and Elaine Ferris.

The purpose of the meeting was to review proposals submitted for the position of record keeper. Two proposals were received, and both were responsive. After review and discussion, the board voted to accept the proposal from Bill Ulman and Marj Bridgman as being the best value for the association. The board also voted to change access to the lock box at Riggs Bank to reflect the record keeper change.

The board voted to alter the T-bill investment strategy put in place at the October 14 meeting to stay with 13-and 26-week T-bills, in view of rising interest rates.

The meeting was adjourned at 5:40 p.m.

TRAFFIC TASK FORCE

Bruce Taylor, of the Fairfax County Office of Transportation, reported to the task force at its meeting on November 16. Mr. Taylor was in charge of the electronic measurement and gathering of data pertaining to the cut-through traffic problem being experienced by our community. He said that "this was one of the most involved studies done by this office."

The report has been turned in to Supervisor Sharon Bulova's office, along with a recommendation by the county that the Virginia Department

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of Transportation complete an evaluation of the report and make recommendations for remedies to the residents. It was expected that the county's Board of Supervisors would issue a resolution to VDOT at its November 21 meeting. As of press time, official word of the resolution's passage had not been received from Supervisor Bulova.

The task force will continue its monitoring and guidance of the report through the "system." We expect to have a progress report at the THA general membership meeting on January 19. Meetings with VDOT regarding remedial recommendations are expected early next spring.

There will be no Traffic Task Force meeting in December. Meanwhile, we wish you all a safe and happy holiday season.

ACC Update: Appearance

The Architectural Control Committee has received a number of complaints concerning apparent violations of the ACC Guidelines as they relate to the outside appearance of Truro properties. The majority of these violations are not major, yet they detract significantly from the appearance of the community as a whole and individual homes in particular.

Two categories of violations are most prevalent: 1) the storage of trash containers next to the house/garage in view of the street, and 2) a proliferation of children's play equipment in front of homes. Except for days scheduled for pick-up, trash containers should be stored in garages or in areas concealed from the street. Children's play equipment also should be placed to the rear of homes where it is not visible from the street. As a separate but related issue, there is a Fairfax County prohibition on placing basketball poles in the grassy area between the sidewalk and street.

We ask that everyone be more aware that these and other items, when improperly stored, present an unattractive appearance. A few moments of your time spent properly storing equipment literally pays off for all.

BRADDOCK DISTRICT COUNCIL | NOTES

VDOT's Snow and Ice Removal Program

The featured speakers at the November 9 meeting of the Braddock District Council were Ken Webster, manager of the Northern Virginia District of the Virginia Department of Transportation, and Bob Minor, of the Transportation Operations Center (TOC) of VDOT.

Mr. Webster spoke at some length on the many lessons learned from last winter's unusually harsh temperatures and major problems in ice and snow removal. These lessons can be grouped in the following categories:

- Review priority designations.
- Reassess equipment distribution and lane miles covered per truck.
- Review use and performance of contractors.
- Determine proper mix and application of sand and chemicals.

As the result of what appears to be a major, genuine assessment of last year's shortcomings, VDOT has developed 15 initiatives for the coming winter season. These include:

- Moving trucks into subdivisions earlier--if not needed for priority 1 and chemical routes.
- Testing the use of four-wheel drive, one-ton trucks and tractors in subdivisions, versus the large 10-wheel trucks which have difficulty maneuvering through subdivi-

sion streets, courts and cul-de-sacs. (Residents are again urged to facilitate snow removal by parking vehicles in driveways to keep these constricted areas as open as possible.)

- Constructing additional salt storage domes.
- Improving procedures for hiring contractor-operated equipment.
- Equipping state truck spreaders with a system to communicate with 370 state trucks.
- Establishing a year-around, 24-hours-a-day, seven-days-a-week Transportation Operations Division.
- Initiating the use of a Geographical Information System to monitor road conditions and snow removal progress.

All in all, it was encouraging to learn that VDOT owned up to last year's poor performance and has conducted an extensive internal assessment of these shortcomings. The 1994-95 initiatives appear promising--to include better service for heretofore often neglected subdivisions. However, the proof will be VDOT's performance in countering whatever Old Man Winter sends our way during the coming months.

Truro Trails: A Quarter-Century of News

"This is your newsletter and we want it to be just that--a place where you can get news of your community and a letter of communication between you and your neighbor."

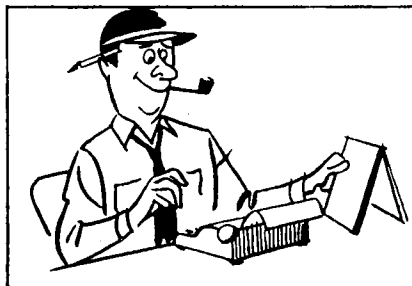
Thus wrote Joan Rosenberg, founding editor of Truro Trails, in the first issue published 25 years ago this month. "This newsletter can develop into whatever you want it to be," Joan went on. "We hope it will contain topics of interest to all Truroites, young and old...We are also hoping to tap the hidden talents of Truroites" and "will welcome contributions to the newsletter from all."

The Rosenbergs no longer live in Truro; they moved away in September 1977. But if Joan were here to read Truro Trails today, she would know that her hopes have been realized. Ever since she put out that first issue a quarter-century ago, Truro Trails has remained a newsletter for and by Truroites.

■■■

Truro Trails began its life without a name. The first issue, whose cover is reproduced on this month's cover (as it was on the newsletter's 10th anniversary issue back in 1979), was entitled simply "Happy Truro Holidays" and the heading on the first page was "???!". In that issue Joan announced a contest to name the newsletter. The prizes were two tickets to the Turnpike Cinema at the Pickett Shopping Center, courtesy of the theater management, and a bottle of Marcel Rochas perfume donated by the late Sandy Brown, of 4316 Wakefield Drive.

The winning name was chosen from a list of 67 submissions by the officers of the Truro Homes Associa-



tion. Their unanimous choice was "Truro Trails," submitted by Pat Murphy of 4161 Elizabeth Lane. The judges' consensus was that this name best reflected the "woody" atmosphere of the Truro community and its wooded parkland.

Two slight variations of the winning name--"Truro's Trails" and "The Trails of Truro"--were so similar to the name selected that duplicate prizes were awarded to their proponent, Cathy Bostak of 4103 Necostin Way.

The new name appeared on the cover of the next issue, and has been on every cover since.

■■■

Although its original purpose and name have survived until today, Truro Trails has changed a lot during its first 25 years. Here are some of the milestones along the way:

- The first issue was published in December 1969. It was to appear bi-monthly.

- Two issues later--the April-May 1970 issue--the cover was printed on colored paper for the first time.

- Until the August-September 1973 issue, each page of the newsletter was printed on one side only. Starting with that issue (when Jonnie Heider began her stint as editor), pages were printed on both sides.

- Truro Trails went

from a bi-monthly to a monthly publication in October 1975.

■ The first photograph used on the cover of Truro Trails--a snowy

NEWS FROM THE FIRST ISSUE

■ Residents of Herman Schmidt Court succeeded in getting their street renamed Kenwyn Court. Dick Abbott, then living at 4309 Herman Schmidt Court, was the leader of the campaign to change the name to that of one of the two rivers that join to form the Truro River in the city of Truro in Cornwall, England.

■ Fairfax County turned down the design for a redwood lamppost that Miller and Smith, the principal builder of Truro, had proposed in lieu of conventional street lighting.

■ Residents were anticipating the arrival of Truro's 100th family. By November 1969, 95 Truro homes had been occupied.

■ Truro welcomed what it believed was its first baby: Jerry Cannon, born October 11, 1969, to Bob and Thelma Cannon of 8707 Chapel Drive. [It later developed that the first baby born in Truro was Anthony Chestnut, son of Russell and Maria Chestnut.]

■ Construction of the parkland bridges was due to get underway soon, weather permitting. Meanwhile, the Community Center complex was expected to open on schedule on Memorial Day, 1970.

■ The widening of Guinea Road from two lanes to four was causing considerable inconvenience to Truro drivers.

■ The Architectural Control Committee explained to Truro Trails readers some of its policies and procedures for handling architectural changes in the community.

parkland scene--was for the February 1976 issue. A number of photos have been used since then.

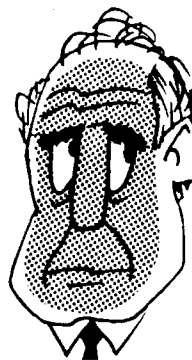
■ The first use of an ink other than black for Truro Trails came in February 1979. The valentine cover for that month was printed in red.

■ Several special issues have been published during Truro Trails' life: an issue on Truro women in November 1975 (in connection with International Women's Year), an issue commemorating the THA's 10th anniversary in May 1978, and the big 25th anniversary issue in May 1993.

■■■

In the early days Truro Trails was prepared on a typewriter, with corrections laboriously made either with white-out or by cut-and-paste. Headlines were set using various styles of press-on type. Art work was enlarged or reduced to fit, and pasted onto the pages.

In December 1987, the THA took pity on the editor and purchased a computer system and the associated software for use in producing Truro Trails. The editor spent January weaning himself away from the typewriter and experiencing the frustrations of learning about menus,

cursors, DOS and disks. The first computer-prepared issue appeared in February 1988. Because of limitations on available type fonts, the headlines continued to be set by hand. By October 1994, however, ad-

ditional software and associated fonts enabled the headlines to be computer-set. Most art work continues to be done by hand.

Truro Trails covers have been wide-ranging in subject, technique, medium and degree of sophistication. Subjects have run the gamut-- parkland scenes, animals and kids, people at play, kites, flowers, sculpture, adaptations of fine art, abstract designs, travel scenes from around the world. Many have been created by Truro artists, including a number of our children.

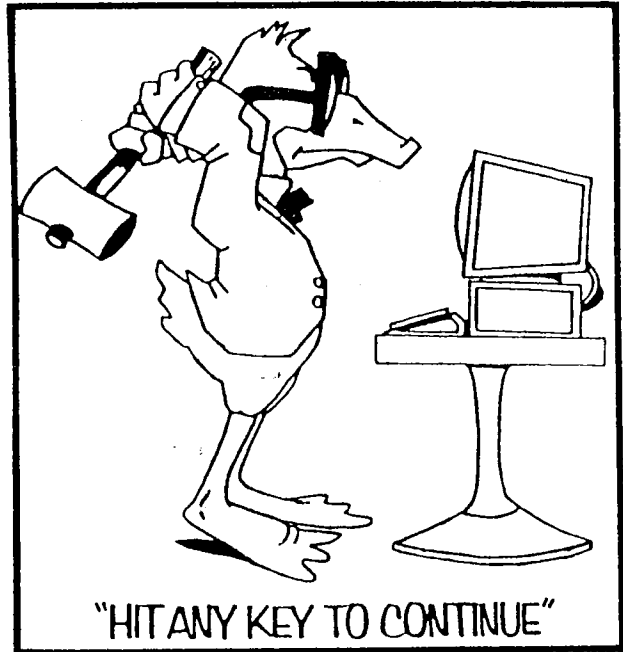


As with any publication produced under the pressure of a deadline, Truro Trails has had its share of boo-boos. There was the September 1990 cover on gypsy moths, delayed from August because of timeliness-- but still reading "AUGUST 1990." There have been numerous typographical errors, some involving the Cardinal Sin: misspelling someone's name. Which leads to the reprinting of these lines by an unknown poet:

 But the typographical error is the only thing you see.



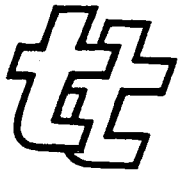
New Directory Is Out
